

Reading

- We will be reading a range of fiction and non-fiction texts throughout the term.
- Our main class novel for this term will be The Boy at the Back of the Class by Onjali Q Rauf.

Reading Comprehension

Children will complete regular reading comprehension activities as well as comprehension linked to our topics and class novel.

Writing

Fiction:

Suspense Story / Adventure Story

Non-fiction:

Explanation text / Persuasive text

<u>Grammar</u>

- Using possessive pronouns to stand in place of nouns or noun phrases.
- Using pronouns appropriately to ensure clarity.
- Using co-ordinating conjunctions 'and', 'but' and 'or' to join two words, phrases, or main clauses of equal importance.
- Using subordinating conjunctions to join a subordinate (less important) clause to a main clause, to add extra information about the main clause.
- Using conjunctions, prepositions, and adverbs to give reasons for something happening.
- Using paragraphs to organise ideas around a theme and show the stages in a story.
- Use negative words in a sentence to change meaning.
- Using question tags at the end of a statement to turn it into a question.
- Forming adjectives using prefixes and suffixes.
- Understanding how words are related in form and meaning (word families).

Punctuation

- Use the wide range of punctuation taught to date.
- Use a comma to separate a question tag from a statement.

Spelling

- Spellings are taught in line with national curriculum statutory requirements.
- Spelling rules are taught as well as words containing common prefixes and suffixes.
- Spellings from the Y4 statutory word list will also be tested as well as revision of spellings from previous year groups.

Place Value:

- Read, write 4-digit numbers and know what each digit represents.
- Compare 4-digit numbers using \leq and \geq .
- Look at place value in decimals and the relationship between tenths and decimals.
- Round 4-digit numbers to the nearest: 10, 100 and 1000.
- Solve number and practical problems that involve all of the above and with increasingly large positive numbers.

Addition & Subtraction:

- Add and subtract numbers with up to 4 digits using the formal written methods of columnar addition and subtraction where appropriate.
- Solve addition and subtraction two-step problems in contexts, deciding which operations and methods to use and why.

Measure:

- Read, write and convert time between analogue and digital 12-hour and 24-hour clocks.
- Solve problems involving converting from hours to minutes; minutes to seconds; years to months; weeks to days.
- Estimate, compare and calculate different measures, including money in pounds and pence.

Geometry:

Mathematics

- Describe positions on a 2D grid as coordinates in the first quadrant.
- Describe movements between positions as translations of a given unit to the left/right and up/down.
- Plot specified points and draw sides to complete a given polygon.

Multiplication & Division:

- Recognise and use factor pairs and commutativity in mental calculations.
- Solve problems involving multiplying and adding, including using the distributive law to multiply two digit numbers by one digit, integer scaling problems and harder correspondence problems such as 'n objects are connected to m objects'.

Fractions:

- Compare numbers with the same number of decimal places up to two decimal places.
- Recognise and write decimal equivalents to $\frac{1}{2}, \frac{1}{2}, \frac{3}{4}$.
- Round decimals with one decimal place to the nearest whole number.
- Find the effect of dividing a one- or two-digit number by 10 and 100, identifying the value of the digits in the answer as ones, tenths and hundredths.
- **Statistics:** Interpret and present continuous data using appropriate graphical methods, including bar charts, and time graphs.

Mental Arithmetic:

Based on targets set for Summer Terms 1 and 2 on Numeracy target cards.

Religious

Science	 Sound & Hearing Vibrations – Children will identify how sounds are made and will understand that sounds can be different but are all made by vibrations. How do we hear sounds? - Children will discover that sounds travel in waves through a medium and that we hear sounds when they reach our ears. Children will identify parts of the ear and learn how the ear and brain work together to hear and make sense of sounds. Pitch & Volume - Children will learn about pitch (how high or low a sound is) and volume (finding out about patterns between the volume of a sound and the strength of the vibrations that produced it). Investigating sound over distance - Children will learn that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases. Materials Solids, liquids, and gases - everything is made up of particles and the arrangement of these particles will define which state it is in: solid, liquid or gas. Changes of states – how materials can change from one state to another, and the processes involved. How temperature affects the rate of change at which materials change from one state to another.
